Frame Asks Renomination as Southfield Supervisor; Cites Accomplishments

In seeking the nomination as supervisor of Southfield Township to succeed himself, D. P. Frame this week stated he is doing so on his record of accomplishments during the past two years and on his program for the future.

Frame stated he completed two years ago on a program calling for "all important matters involving major expenditures of funds to first be referred to the people for their approval."

"I have kept faith by doing this in several instances, both by mail and thru special township meetings, a thing never before attempted in Southfield," Frame said.

Part of Program

A major part of his program, he explained, was the proper and accurate assessment of all property so that each one would bear his fair share of the taxes. It also called for the township records being brought up to date on each piece of property.

"This work is now being done as rapidly as possible. Thru the assessments which have so far been made and the equalizing of assessments there has been obtained this year, a reduction of 57c per \$1,000 in the tax rate, as you will notice from your tax statements. This you will agree is a step in the right direction.

"When the records on every piece of property have been completed and all assessments made, there should be an even greater reduction in the tax rate for everyone," he stated.

Improved Fire Protection

Another item on his program called for the expansion of the fire department as rapidly as conditions required. Frame pointed out that this is being done as evidenced by the fact that first, a qualified, trained man who has had 25 years of experience has been employed as chief of the department. And, second by the presentation of a comprehensive long range program for improved fire protection, which the people have approved, providing for four fire stations to be strategically located, and modern fire fighting equipment with additional full time firemen to man it.

"As this program is put into effect it will not only give the township better fire protection, but it will also give a large majority of the home owners a reduction of \$3.00 per thousand in

fire insurance rates on their homes," he said.

For the Future

For the future, Frame advocates completion of the program he has stated of equalizing assessments, the reassessment of every piece of property on an equitable basis and the establishment of an assessing department to continue this work. He believes there should be developed a township-wide water supply system to make available an adequate safe supply of water for all purposes including fire protection. Such a program would make water available to subdivisions and areas which would not otherwise be able to afford this source of water. He also needs it, such as Bonnie Acres and many other areas.

"A public utility providing a safe and an adequate supply of water is of prime importance to the health and protection of a rapidly growing community such as Southfield township," Frame declared.

Elected Two Years Ago

An amendment, introduced in the 1949 session of the legislature, to the "dog law" at Frame's request, would permit Southfield to regulate the licensing and control of dogs, by the township, as another measure for the safety and protection of everyone.

Practically all of Frame's business experience has been in an executive capacity. For 18 years he was with the H. J. Heinz Co. in the accounting and sales departments. During the war for a period of nearly four years he was with the Packard Motor Car Co., as an auditor in charge of contract terminations. He was elected two years ago as supervisor of Southfield township.

Hon. J. VanZandt To Be Guest Speaker At Lincoln Banquet

The Hon. James E. VanZandt, veteran congressman from Altoona, Pa., will be guest speaker at the 59th annual Oakland County Lincoln Club Republican banquet Feb. 11 to be held at St. Benedict's Parish Hall on West Huron. Pontiac, four blocks west of Telegraph road.

VanZandt, elected to Congress in 1938, has served on various committees which worked to bring about systematized shipbuilding, expansion of the war shipping administration, the U. S. Maritime service, and the Merchant Marine. His amendment to the revenue act exempted members of the armed services from federal income tax payments while on duty.

During World War II he commanded an LST group which landed Navy, Marine and Army combat units at 26 beachheads. Before the war ended, VanZandt was promoted to captain and awarded the Legion of Merit and the Bronze Star.

From 1932 to 1935 he served as commander-in-chief of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Tickets for the banquet may be obtained in the offices of the county prosecutor, county clerk or sheriff's department in Pontiac.

Danish Silver

Ceramics and ceramic sculpture is displayed from Paul Bogatay, Charles Dusenbury, Marion Lawrence Foadick, John A. Foster of Wayne University, Sva Lindberg Kline, Edgar Littlefield, Glen Louka, Gertrude and Otto Nitzler, Adolf Orforer, Henry Varum Post, Lily Swann Saarinen, Kalvin and Mary Scheier, Viktor Schreckengost, Mary Chase Stratton of Detroit, Franz and Marguerite Willenhand, Lydia Winston of Birmingham, Murray Douglas, Art Instructor at Brookside School Cranbrook, and Majja Griell, Head of the Ceramics Department, Cranbrook Academy of Art.

The exhibition of Danish silver is on loan from H. Nils of New York, the American distributor and is composed of flatware and holloware, in some examples combined with wood and enamel. Some of the designs are collaborative and the work of Stah-Neilson, Kay Fisker whose work is also in the permanent Cranbrook Art Museum collection, and Erik Herlov, who made a tea set presented to Queen Ingrid last spring, is represented.

The Michigan Work in Progress show contains six paintings of Wallace Mitchell, fabrics by Samuel E. Tushingham, ceramics by Louis Raynor and metalwork by William and Charlotte Whitney and Robert Eaton. Museum hours are from 2 to 5 daily, except Mondays.

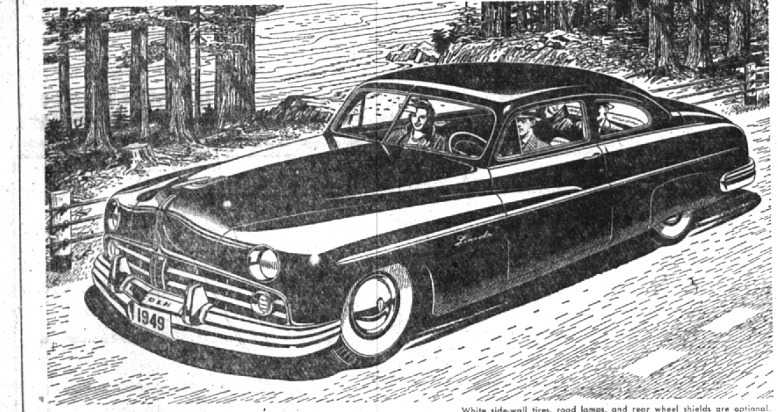
Church League Has Three Teams Tied For Top Position
