City's School of Religion Starts; Enrollment Large

A total of 78 persons registered at the opening of the School of Religion in Birmingham. The announcement was made by Miss Elaine Jones, who is acting as registrar during the illness of Mrs. Stewart Smith. The school is sponsored by the local Council of Churches.

Keep Discussions Moving Discussion leaders are Karl Lutz and Kenneth Ratcliff, with Edw. F. Reid as substitute. Their function is merely to keep the discussion moving by asking questions, and to put on the brakes when several members try to participate at once.

While the Great Books Group will conclude their meetings in April, those who expressed interest in the program but were unable to attend on Tuesday nights, will probably have another opportunity to join next fall when it is expected another Great Books Group will form here, Miss Lloyd explained.
