

### "School of World Missions" Begins This Week at First Baptist Church

To give the church and community an understanding of the world impact of the Christian movement—such is the aim of the School of World Missions to be held at the First Baptist Church. The sessions of the school will meet on the four Wednesday evenings of February and the school gets under way this week.

Sessions open each Wednesday evening with a family supper at 6:45. Meals are to be served for a nominal sum in order to enable the entire family to participate. Following the meal, there will be a brief devotional period conducted by various members of the church. Different types of mission presentations will highlight each evening. There will be separate classes for the children with provision for stories, songs and handwork and a nursery for the little tots.

### Paul Penfield Heads Radio Committee For Council of Churches

Paul L. Penfield, 384 Lake Park, was named chairman of the committee on radio at the 30th annual banquet of the Detroit Council of Churches held in Detroit last Thursday evening. Over 600 delegates from the various churches in the metropolitan area attended.

It was reported that the income of the council for 1948 was \$73,504.17, almost 15 per cent higher than any previous year. A budget for \$86,836.69 was adopted for 1949. The Rev. I. C. Johnson announced that Feb. 20 would be observed in Council churches as "United Action Sunday."

The Rev. G. Merrill Lenox, executive secretary, urged the council to make special effort to obtain a building to house its own offices and perhaps to include the various Protestant denominational headquarters.

"Such a building would be a tangible symbol of Protestant strength and unity," he said.
