**53-35 Maple Score Places Hazel Park on Mourners' Bench**

Sparked by Bob Folin's 16 points, the Maple cagers combined their team work and shooting to vanquish Hazel Park's quintet 53-35 in the Birmingham gym last Friday night.

No less spectacular than Folin's performance was the feat turned in by Pat Webb. Due to lack in jury, Wall was withheld from his berth on the starting lineup. When he finally went in, late in the final quarter, Wall dodged his guard and broke through the defense to score four field markers for four attempts. As a finale he plunked in a charity throw for 4,000 on shots, Wall's nine point total was fired within approximately two minutes time.

The entire Maple squad's passing and shooting were honed a little keener than that displayed in the Ferndale contest. Although the Maroons' foul shooting is still below par, their opponents' attempts were even weaker. The Maples put away only six for 18 attempts for a 33.3 average while the Vikings sank a mere one out of ten for an anemic ten per cent.

The Vikings' six foot six inch star center, Hugh Hays, obviously didn't turn in the stellar performance expected of him. Despite his height, the Maroons dominated the backboards and completely bottled up the cloud pusher's scoring attempts. The Vikings didn't really threaten the Maples at any time, but provided some tense moments. 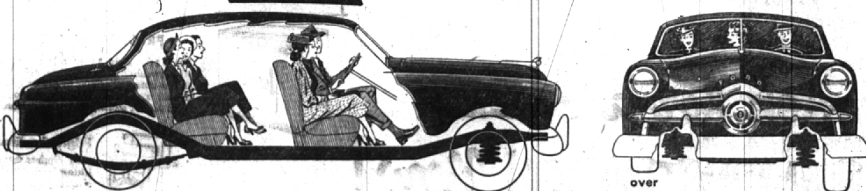
