Olympic Trackman Assembly Speaker

Harrison Dillard, Olympic and world track champion, yesterday spoke to the Baldwin students about his experiences at the Olympic games in London in the first of two sports assemblies to be presented this week.

Holder of world records in the high and low hurdles, Dillard won 82 consecutive races, running against the country's top track stars. He went to the Olympic trials at Evanston, Ill., and lost his 83rd race to Bill Porter, now a resident of Birmingham.

Against the wishes of his long-time friend and idol, Jesse Owens, Dillard entered the 100 yard dash, coming in second behind Barney Ewell.

At the Olympic games he was rated behind Ewell and Mel Patton, but ran ahead of the whole field to win in 1:10.3, equaling the Olympic record held by Eddie Tolan and Jesse Owens, his teacher.

Dillard gave the students an idea of the excitement and thrills he had as he ran, and watched, the world famous event. He is making an extended speaking tour on behalf of Baldwin-Wallace.
