

### Redford Union Loses to Reserves

Coming from behind in the final minutes of play, Birmingham's reserve basketball team edged an alert Redford Union reserve squad 40-35, extending the winning streak to five straight last Tuesday at Redford.

Although the Maples led by a slim margin during most of the

game, the Panthers capitalized on their inaccurate passes for several field goals.

Birmingham built up a 15-10 lead in the opening quarter, when both teams connected on a large percentage of their shots. In the second quarter, Redford surged ahead to cut the Maples' lead to a scant three points when the half ended 24-21, Birmingham's favor.

By the end of the third quarter, the Panthers had gradually whittled down the Maples' margin to a slim two points.

In the final stanza, Redford scored three quick field goals and pulled ahead, only to have victory

snatched away when the Maples rallied in the closing minutes to clinch the game.

Birmingham's Bob Hardy topped the scorers with 13. Karp was high for Redford Union with ten points.
