### City Will Absorb Overruns in Two Assessment Projects

Overexpenditures on two special assessment districts, caused by underestimation of costs, will be included in the city's 1948-50 budget, city commissioner agreed Monday night.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert reported that actual costs of paving Eton road, between Maple and Yorkshire, exceeded estimates by \$2,751.96. Since only \$48,75 of this amount could be reassessed against private property, it was decided that reassessment was not feasible and that the city would absorb the entire additional cost.

A second project, improvement of Chapin, went over the estimated amount by \$2,007.69 because of a change in plans after the district was created. This overrun will also be absorbed by the city in the next fiscal budget, commissioner's decided.

### Seek Entire Parcel of Property for Webster Storm Drain

The city will ask for condemnation of the entire eight-tenths of an acre parcel of Dobony property, just east of the 42nd right-of-way, rather than just the easement for the continuation of the Webster storm drain.
