### Guarantee Water, Sewer Connections for 20 Years Only

Residential and commercial water and sewer service connections are to be guaranteed by the city for a 20-year period only, it decided Monday evening by the city commission.

Commissioners approved a new form of water and sewer service permit which stipulates the city will not guarantee this service connection for a longer period.

In past years, the city has been forced to replace services which were more than 20 years old simply because the guarantee limit was not clearly defined.

Several weeks ago, in preliminary discussions on this point, commissioners agreed that 20 years is the average lifetime of such a service connection. They argued that unless a time limit was enforced, some resident might come in 40 or 50 years after the installation and demand the city replace the service. This has happened in several instances, city officials pointed out.
