she was almost constantly aware of a dull throbbing ache. "Even with the drugs, sleep was difficult," she said, "but that's all past. Right now it hurts to talk or walk, or even chew my food. Every move seems to jar it. That will be past soon, too. I have only to guard against infection and to wait for the operation."

Today the hours of pain are memories. The days during which she lay motionless, unable to do much as move her head, are past. The years spent half-groaning, during which she walked always in shadow are gone.

True, she became a nurse, she read, went to shows, and even taught herself to play, by ear, leading as normal a life as she could possibly make for herself. Those days, though, are gone, and soon she will know the joy of seeing clearly the things around her. The satisfaction of meeting her friends and knowing them at a distance. The comfort of reading a book without strain and force. The complete pleasures of flowers, trees, birds, far-off hills and the glorious things which those who have their full sight take so much for granted. She will know, for the first time, the freedom of full sight and awareness of the sharp beauties around her.

In speaking of the operation, Miss Hamilton said, "It is expensive and painful, but worth every bit of it. I did not want to undergo it had I had success before consenting. Friends urged me to do it, so that hope might be given to others around Birmingham, that they, too, might see clear."

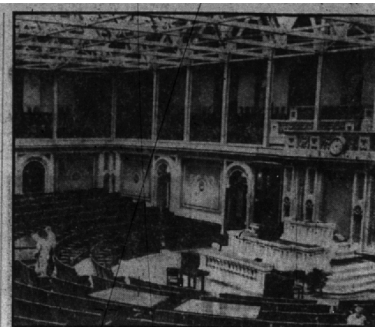
