Eight New Mail Men to Be Added

The postal delivery service in Birmingham is going to be better than ever according to Acting Postmaster Bernard E. Fowler, who announced this week that he has received notice from Washington to increase the number of city mail carriers from the present 15 to 23.

Fowler stated that five prospective carriers have already qualified through civil service examinations and are awaiting assignment to routes immediately.

According to Fowler, 15 of the local post office has been extended to include Farmbrook rd. from Franklin to Telegraph.

These are 61 families on this stretch that will experience mail service direct to their homes for the first time.

A new parcel post truck also will enter into service this week according to Fowler.

MSC Home Ec Class Visits Local Schools

Sixteen members of a Michigan State College summer school class in homemaking, under the direction of Assistant Professor Margaret Vosnick, included the home economics department of Barnum Junior High and Baldwin High School in their field trip itinerary last Friday.

The group arrived in Birmingham at 3:30 in the afternoon and were shown through the two departments by Norman A. Wolf, assistant superintendent of schools.

Couzens Request Ordinance Change

The request of Frank Couzens, Jr., and James Couzens, II, was tabled by the city commission at their Monday night meeting for further study.

The men had asked that an ordinance be made to City Ordinance 346, which will effect the construction of a warehouse they are building on the corner of Woodward and 12 and one half feet high, with no partitions.

The present ordinance calls for a building of not more than 12 feet square feet, or, if larger, separated by fire walls to create divisions here and there.

Couzens pointed out that they were forced to erect this building at this point because they were unable to secure storage space in the city. They added that the restriction placed upon them by the ordinance would make the building of practically no use to them since that they would have to alter their plans.
