face the happy future which "Sarge" does, for an average of 10 a month are destroyed.

City officials feel that this, for the most part, is due strictly to owners who do not comply with the law which dogs must not be allowed to run free and must be leashed. Their records show that only 1,650 tags were issued this year, against 1,250 in 1948. They feel that the dog population has increased rather than decreased during that time, and that there are many unlicensed dogs in the city. Some owners avoid this by keeping their pets closely penned, but others are allowed to roam the streets, a nuisance to many who maintain gardens, a menace to traffic and, themselves, liable to injury or death on the streets and highways.


