**State Official Will Speak Here Tonight**

Dr. Gunnar Dybwad, supervisor of the State of Michigan's department of social welfare, children's division, will be the speaker at a dinner meeting tonight at the Community House. He will speak on "Nazism and the German Family Pattern."

Dr. Dybwad has recently returned from spending three months in Germany. He was one of a three-man commission sent to Germany by the United States government to make a study of child welfare.

According to Miss Margaret Olmstead, social worker for the Pontiac State hospital, the meeting will be open to the public.
