The Regular Navy is now accepting applications for commissions in the Medical Service Corps. It was announced recently by Lieutenant Commander A. J. Schultz, Jr., USN, in charge of Naval Officer Recruitments in Detroit.

Vacancies exist in pharmacy, optometry and 15 other sciences which are being filled by the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force. Applicants must be between the ages of 21 and 32 (30 for women). Applicants holding an AB, BS, or OD degree in optometry, pharmacy, or science allied to medicine will be commissioned as ensigns and those holding DSc or PhD in the above fields will be commissioned lieutenants (junior grade).

The U. S. Air Force has announced that aviation cadet training will soon be expanded to include training of navigators as well as pilots. The first class of navigation trainees is scheduled to enter the program at the Air Force Base, Houston, Tex. New classes will follow every 30 days.

Qualifications for training as navigator will be substantially the same as those required for pilot training. Applicants must be between 20 and 26½ years of age at the time of making application. Must have satisfactorily completed at least one-half of the credits leading to a degree at an accredited college or university, or be required to accomplish the aviation cadet educational examination instead, if only a high school graduate.

Physical standards required for navigation training, especially those for hearing and eye-sight, will be somewhat lower than those required for pilot training. Those who successfully complete the navigation school will receive reserve commissions as 2nd Lieutenants and will be ordered to active duty for at least three years.

The Hot Springs meeting is one of three regional conferences held each year by the Aetna Life to present to its field representatives reports of recent developments in the life insurance underwriting field.

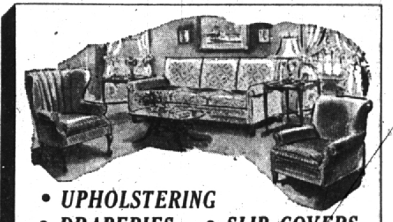
