Local Y Sponsors Two Travel Tours to Western States

The Birmingham YMCA has planned two travel tours as a part of the Camp Totem Pole program, this coming summer.

The first of these, for adults only, is a circle tour of the west by train. The group will leave Birmingham early the morning of July 2 and not return until midnight on July 16. The first stop for the group in Chicago where a steamer will be boarded to take the group to Grand Canyon.

After an overnight stop at Bright Angel hotel, a full day will be spent in visiting places of interest along the Canyon rim. The group will leave by night train to Los Angeles making the Alexandria Hotel their headquarters.

A trip to Catalina Island, by charter boat, with a chance to swim in the Pacific will be followed by dinner, dancing and the floor show at the Biltmore Bowl.

A trip through one of the leading Hollywood studios will bring the group in contact with many of the present film stars.

Will Visit Yosemite An automobile excursion to picturesque Yosemite National Park will give the group a chance to see nature at its very best. Back to San Francisco, where the Whitcomb Hotel has been chosen as headquarters, and a sightseeing trip through the famous Redwood forests are also a part of the itinerary.

The northern return trip will start from Seattle. It includes a boat trip to Victoria and a visit to the famous Butchart Gardens. A fish dinner on the boat and a chance to see the northwest will be afforded everyone. The return trip will cut across the western states with the train coming back.

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To Chicago and hence to Detroit. The group will be in charge of Sandy Newell from Wyandotte.

The second trip is for junior high and grade school youngsters and is a four day motor trip to Chicago. The group, leaving on July 13, will stop at Niles for dinner. After arrival in Chicago where the YMCA Hotel will be their headquarters, the group will shower and eat dinner at Yorkers restaurant.

In the evening they will visit Grand Park and listen to the out-of-door concert. Monday will be spent in visiting the Chicago Museum (formerly Marshall Field Museum), the Shedd aquarium and the Adler planetarium. Dinner that night will be at the Y-hotel followed by a motor trip up the outer drive to the Evanston campus of Northwestern University.

Tuesday, the group will visit the University of Chicago Chapel, the Rosenwald Museum of Science and Industry and then motor to the famous Brookfield Zoo. Dinner will be in Chicago's Chinatown and will be followed by tour of the Chinese Merchants Court.

Wednesday, the group will visit the Chicago historical society and have lunch at Lincoln Park Zoo. The return trip will start about 8 a.m. with stops at Kalamazoo and Detroit.

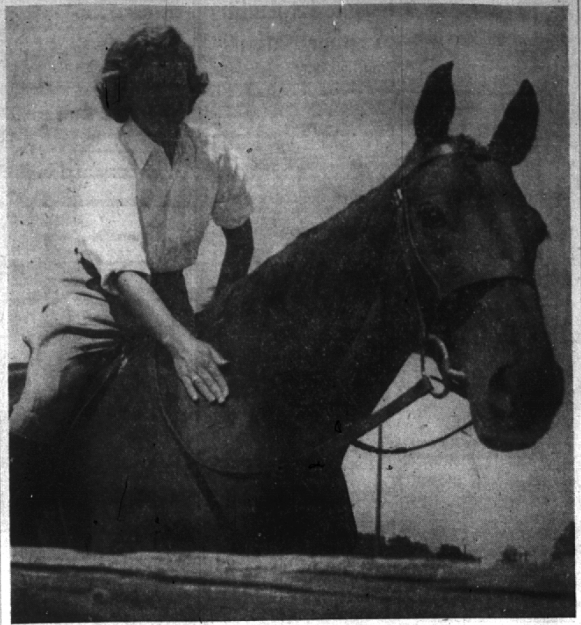
The date of the election of officers for the center will be announced later.

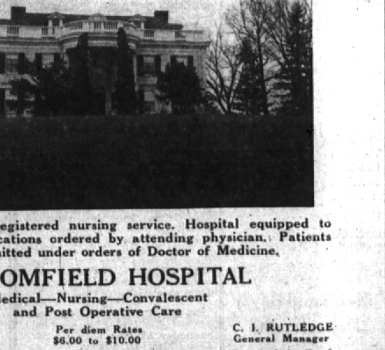
Cranbrook Summer Theater Begins Its Eighth Season Next Monday

YMCA Explains Camp Totem Pole's Plan to Parents

If you hear children talking about the Birmingham 'Y' being in the pink, they are probably referring to the pink brochures announcing the Da-Y program of the YMCA operating under the pseudonym of Camp Totem Pole. In the explanatory note to parents, the 'Y' makes this statement:

"The Birmingham YMCA offers Camp Totem Pole for your child's summer experience. The program is designed to meet the needs for directed and supervised activity in events that appeal to the imagination of youngsters. For all, there will be trips to various points of interest; hiking, swimming, softball, league ball, attendance at Tiger Ball games, bike hikes, cook outs, and craft.

The Camp Totem Pole is designed as a substitute for an all-round camping experience that may be enjoyed at Camps Ojibwa, Nissokine, Hoy-Went-Ha, or Maho-Gah-See; rather it is a program for boys and girls wanting to go to camp, or those who have returned, and those who are in the city. The program is just a pseudonym and will be used only to identify the group.

"Our purpose is to keep youngsters busy doing something constructive, learning something new, and experiencing something fascinating in the kind of environment that will aid in their character growth and provide clean, wholesome fun."

Nominal Cost
Costs of activities are nominal and are printed on the calendar schedule of each day's activities in the folder. Next week's schedule calls for a trip to the Detroit Zoological gardens on Monday; Tuesday the group has horseback riding in the afternoon; Wednesday features a trip through the Detroit Creamery and the Continental Baking company; Thursday is a hike through the woods and a stop at the Cranbrook Museum of Science. Travelogue movies and comic cartoons are planned for Friday along with craft work.

All activities have adult supervisors and originate at the 'Y' office at 139 West Maple. Social brochures and folders are available on particular trips and reservations for any one event are limited to 60. This paper will carry short articles about special week-end trips which appear in the folder.

Information may be obtained by calling the 'Y' or stopping in at 139 West Maple. Youngsters 8 through 15 years of age are eligible to attend one or all events.

Tips on Touring

It takes a trick to beat a trickster, and the smart tourist will have a few up his sleeve when vacation time rolls around.

The out-and-out fraud doesn't happen too often, but the alert traveler will keep a few things in mind. The sightseeing guide who hops your running board with fast talk usually doesn't have credentials; the photographer who promises home-town publicity in return for a print order usually has no regular newspaper; the slick money changer in amusement parks who manages to fumble bills while talking may be "slow change" artist; the man who jingles you in a crowd may be after your wallet; the unlicensed porter may never come back with your luggage.

Be on the watch for machine-made "local handicraft" souvenirs; restaurant checks with illegible words and figures; taxis without meters or posted rates; free-lance offers to wash your car or baggage; bogus c.o.d. packages directed to neighbors during your absence.

Three precautions to remember: (1) Carry large sums of money in traveler's checks. (2) Investigate before you pay. (3) Don't trust your eyes. If something for nothing is made as a special favor, and demands immediate action.

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
