## Fly, Mosquito Control Measures Are Outlined

Clean, screen, drain and DDT. Now. This is the Michigan Department of Health's recommendation for summer-long fly and mosquito control, according to LaRue Miller, environmental engineer of the department.

"Every insect you kill right now means thousands less to harass you in late summer," he said. "One pair of flies, for instance, breeding in early spring would have more than five billion descendants by fall, if all of them were allowed to live and reproduce. Mosquitoes are equally prolific."

"First step in fly and mosquito control is to eliminate their breeding places. For the most part, they breed in manure piles, cesspools, outdoor toilets, rotting garbage in cans or dumps, decaying animal matter, and in unclean chicken coops, pig pens, pet houses and cow sheds."

Dispose of Refuse  
"Clean up your property by disposing of all garbage, refuse or manure piles. Keep all garbage cans tightly covered and wash them frequently. Rid the yard and alley of tin cans, tubs, bottles and any other containers which might hold water. Drain all ponds and standing water holes and apply oil containing DDT," Miller suggested.

Screen, lightly, all buildings where food, milk, or humans are housed. Inspect and mend or replace old screens and then paint them with a five percent solution of DDT in an oil base.

Spray the garbage can and its vicinity, doorways, the overhang of low roofs and porches (with special attention to porch ceilings) thoroughly wetting them with a five percent solution of DDT in an oil base. Repeat once during the season.

Treat bushes, hedges and lawns with a one percent solution of wettable DDT powder in water, repeating every 10 to 14 days to keep the mosquito population down.

"Keep DDT away from the food of humans or animals. Do not apply spray directly on animals, and wash thoroughly if you get the spray on you."

Miller contended. Pamphlets on the use of DDT for fly and mosquito control are available without charge from the Michigan Department of Health, Lansing 4, Mich.

## Crabrook Students Win Four Prizes in Textile Competition

Four of the five prize winning designs were awarded two students at the Crabrook Academy of Art in the Third Annual Competition for Jacquard textile designs, sponsored by U.S. Art School students by the Moss Manufacturing Company, of Philadelphia. The \$500 first prize and the \$200 second prize went to Clara Nordfors, Bloomfield Hills, while two of the three \$100 third prizes went to David Zeese, of Detroit.

Honorable mentions were awarded to Miss Nordfors, Zeese, Jimmy Lee Snow and Axlana S. Thorpe, all of Crabrook. In learning that so many of the winning designs were by students of Crabrook, the jury paid tribute to Marianne Strengell, head of the textile design department of the Crabrook Academy of Art.

An outstanding feature of the more than 150 entries, from 14 schools throughout the country, was their freshness and originality, with a noticeable emphasis on abstract motifs and subtle color gradations to give texture. Conventional floral designs were distinctly in the minority, a large portion of the entries having a decided contemporary flavor, both in pattern and coloring.

According to Berthold Stranus, president of Moss Reze, this year's competition was one of the best of the three that have been held so far. He said that he hoped to tour the winning designs as soon as plans could be made.
