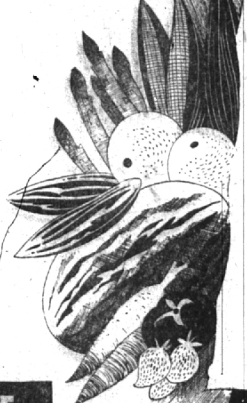

### Tips on Touring

A drive in the rain, like a walk in a spring shower, can be sheer enjoyment if you are prepared for it and follow a few basic common sense rules:  
(1) Treat any surface, hard top, gravel, pavement, or oil with respect while you "get the feet of the road."  
(2) Slow down to a sensible speed, double or triple the usual space between you and the car ahead — and enjoy the ride.  
(3) Keep a sharp eye out for oil slicks, slippery leaves and mud. If you can throw your hat into a sudden spin if you hit them wrong.  
(4) The little animals that come out in the rain — frogs, woodchucks, skunks, etc. — can be a source of danger if you drive too fast or real enjoyment if you take it easy.  
(5) Street car and railroad tracks glisten beautifully in the rain — but cross them cautiously and at wide angles.  
(6) A clean-wiping windshield wiper and another working brakes are an absolute must for wet weather.  
It's fun to drive in the rain — and safe, too.

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
