Meat Cut Quiz

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?
 A. This is a butt half of smoked ham.
 Q. Where does the cut come from and how is it identified?
 A. The butt half of ham is the upper, or hind, half of the ham, as contrasted to the lower or pointed shank half. The ham is marked with a large "H" and a small "B" on the side. The shank bone is a long bone (the shank bone) and the other the round or leg bone. The butt half ham contains a good portion of the center cut of ham.
 Q. How should this cut be prepared?
 A. The butt half of ham should be roasted as should any other tender cut of meat. Place the roast, fat-side up, on a rack in an open shallow roasting pan and roast until tender in a 300° F. oven, allowing about 15 minutes per pound. The butt half of ham may also be cooked in liquid for variety. Cover with liquid (water or broth) and cook covered at a simmering temperature, allowing 30 minutes per pound.
