Judging by the number of inquiries received, the summer theatre project of the Birmingham Recreation Board is sponsoring a newly instituted feature, in which students of high schools throughout the city—already more than 150 high school students participate in the six-week project. College students who have been interested in showing their eagerness, too, to accept the chance to develop their talents through the Birmingham Summer Players. Many who gave outstanding performances in plays and variety shows during their years at Baldwin are now being considered for parts in the five plays slated for production this summer by Sally Howard, who was graduated from Baldwin last June, and is now studying drama and acting in California.
