Cranes Place 3rd In Prep Schools' Track-Field Meet

Cranbrook School took third place in the 19th annual Interstate preparatory league championship track and field meet at Western Reserve Academy, Hudson, Ohio, on Saturday. Reserve took first place with 40 1/2 points, the University School of the South second with 36 1/2 and the Crane team was close behind with 35.

Bill Macomber was in the 140 1/2 to take first and Bing Murray placed second. Macomber's shot put of 46'8" was good for first and Ron Ballantyne was fourth. Toby Maxwell won the mile in 4:38.8 for a school record and also placed first in the 880.

In the 220 yard relay, Jack Bohon, Jay Corley, Robert Lester, Milt Matter and Dave Onos took second and Allen Cargile placed second in the 220 yard low hurdles. The Crane team of Jack Bohon, Jack Lewis and Dick Wilson placed fourth in the 400 yard relay. Jack Bohon was second in the broad jump and Russ Dawson and Charles Cunningham were in the 6-way tie for the pole vault event.

The Crane tennis team won from Shady Side Academy 4-1 at Pittsburgh on Saturday, to take the League championship. Gunther Balz led the only Crane win, John Brownell 4-6, 4-6. Bob Blanchard defeated George Kessel 6-3, 8-6 and Harry Hutton won from Jack Warden 6-2, 6-3.

Bill Broder and Fred Steinmann won 6-4, 6-2 from Paul Benedum and Bill Booth and Franklin Nau and Bill Moreno had little difficulty disposing of Jim Rae and Fred Bessinger 6-2, 6-2. During the season, the tennis squad won ten meets and lost two, both to Ham-track.

Cranbrook's varsity baseball team won from Sunny Side Academy on Saturday, 3-0, in the 3 score, during which Cranbrook stole seven bases. In the first inning, Fritz Dow grounded out to third. John Hatch got a single and stole second. John Rice struck out. Dick Breck got a first on an error and Dave Seeber walked, filling the bases.

Rufe Beardsley was hit by a wild pitch from Hatch home. John Knoblock came up and Dick Breck scored on an error by the first baseman. Knoblock scored second and Dave Seeber scored on a squeeze play and Beardsley was caught on the base to end the inning with three runs.

In the third, John Rice was hit by a pitched ball. Dick Breck walked but Rice was put out. Breck stole second and Dave Seeber fled out to second base. Beardsley struck out but Breck scored from second on an error by the catcher.
