(Score and nonsense at the bridge table. Other settings.)

This fascinating game grows curiouser and curiouser each time you play it. That's why it's fascinating. Contracts that look rock-bound and airtight when dummy goes down are defeated by several tricks because of that old devil "distribution". On the other hand, impossible contracts are often completed because "distribution" metamorphoses into the declarer's first cousin. Here is one of the good type:

East dealt and hid one heart. South (silly girl) overcalled with one spade. West hid two diamonds (no comment). North hid three clubs. East doubled. South and West passed. North hid three spades. East (the snake) doubled that too.

South took the opening heart lead with her ace—and had problems. "I don't like it. What am I going to do with all my losers? Cross-ruff? N. G. I'll have to let them in with a heart or diamond and the so-and-so's are bound to kill dummy's trumps with trump leads. Squeeze in dummy? Not enough entries. So—the one small hope is to set up that club suit for discards. Here goes."

South led the club four and finessed dummy's ten. East won

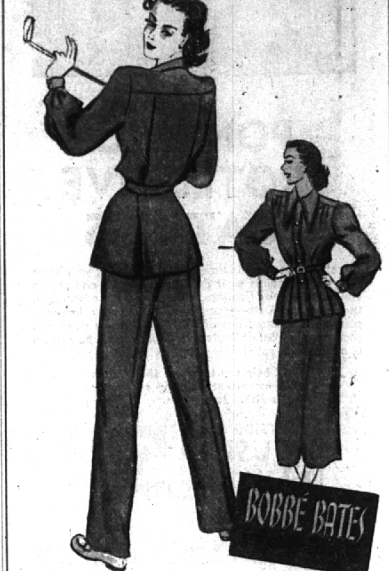
with the queen and triumphantly cashed the two top spades and the heart king. Then he led a diamond. South took the trick in dummy with the ace. She cashed the club ace. Then she ruffed a club, establishing the suit. And dummy's heart jack was both an entry and a means of stripping West of his last trump.

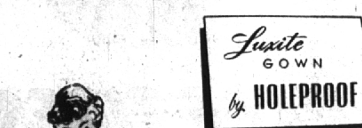

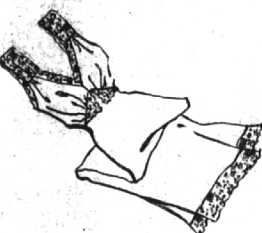

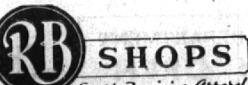
