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Girl Scout Penny Drive Is Set for Saturday, June 4

"Tinkle, clink, rustle." What's that? It's the combined pingy banks of all Birmingham being held of these pennies, dimes, quarters and folding money in preparation for the annual Girl Scout Penny Drive to be held Saturday, June 4, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the streets of Birmingham.

In the event of rain, hang on to all coins until the following Saturday, June 11. For the newcomers to town, this is the one annual public appeal which our Girl Scouts are trying to make in maintaining their cabin at Springdale Park. It's a place for sleep-outs, picnics and day camps but it does have to be insured, it requires fuel for the fireplace, plumbing repairs, new purchases of equipment and general upkeep and for this purpose a "mile of pennies" is the annual aim of the penny drive.

Tapes on Walls
The tapes on which your contributions will be placed have been made available by Ralph Struck, and will be on the sidewalks at the four corners of Woodward and Maple, stretching along the north side of Maple west as far as the Wabcock Building, on the south

side of Maple west to LaBelles; on the west side of Woodward from Burr's to McBride's Hardware, and on the east side of Woodward from the National Bank south to Davidson's.

There will also be tapes in front of Krogers, A. and P. and Campbell's Village Store. Headquarters for the adults assisting with the Penny Drive will be a desk on Maple at the side of Wilson Drug Company, where members of the board of directors of the Birmingham Girl Scout Council will make change, give information and receive proceeds from the various locations. Intermediate Scouts will man the tapes and will be assisted by their troop leaders and mothers.

Scouts and Soap
"A Girl Scout is a friend to all and a sister to every other Girl Scout" is not just one of the Girl Scout laws which the girls of Troop 2 at Adams school repeat unthinkingly. Throughout the past year they have been intensely interested in Finland and have had Miss Clara Nordforst, a Finnish art student at the Cranbrook Academy of Art as their guest at troop meetings.

They have learned about Girl Guides in Finland about their camps, which Miss Nordforst attended, and about their extensive outdoor and camping program. Being wise little Girl Scouts they know you can't build a campfire or take a long nature hike without getting your uniform and shoes and your hands even more so.

Consequently when they read in the "Girl Scout Leader" that provision could be made thru the American Friends Service committee for sending soap to Finland, they unanimously voted to spend the \$4 remaining on their treasury (usually used for an end-of-the-year picnic or party) to purchase four dozen bars of soap and send them to Miss Nordforst's homeland.
