The Oakland county chapter, whose members represent 16 commercial banks, has a membership of 350. Its primary function is to conduct specialized courses in banking subjects, seven of which were presented last year.

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### Participates in Army Experiment

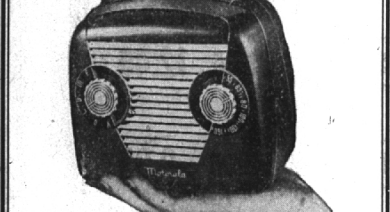
Lieutenant Theodore J. Huxford, a student at the Chemical Corps School, Edgewood Arsenal, Md., is now at Camp Lee, Va., taking part in the Army's first experiment in analyzing all the services of supply, communication and transportation under a single "Logistical Division".

He is one of more than 600 staff members and students from Army technical schools sent here for the exercise, and is acting as a player in the chemical phase of a theoretical invasion of southern France patterned after the campaign of 1944.

Lieutenant Huxford will return to school at Edgewood Arsenal upon completion of the exercise Friday. He and his wife, Mrs. Lois A. Huxford, and three children live there at 17 Allen Road. A veteran of World War II, Lieutenant Huxford landed at Salerno on "D" day and was at Anzio with the 84th Chemical Mortar Battalion. After being wounded in 1945 he spent 18 months in the hospital, but has been on active duty ever since.

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
