With only two senior regulars graduating, prospects for a winning season next year are exceptionally bright.

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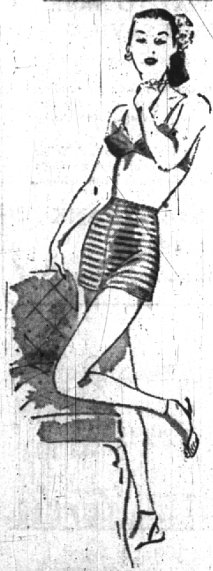

Town Board Meets
 The board meeting was held Tuesday evening in the Southfield town hall.

Dudley P. Frame, supervisor, presiding. A number of important items were brought before the Board, namely: Redford Union School district comprises territory which partially lies in Southfield Township consisting of an 80 acre tract which they deem not feasible to retain. It was requested that Southfield township detach that portion which lies solely within the township of Southfield at approximately Eight Mile and Telegraph roads, and attach to the township school district of Southfield. The board approved such an action.

The board granted an open-air dance permit to Christ Nicholson at 28875 Franklin road. Clara Lane, board member, protested that decision and it was decided that an investigation would be made after the dance area is in operation, and a report be brought back for the next board meeting.

Grievances against water pressure in Section 31 were brought up. The supervisor said he had contacted engineer Frank Norris to make a survey and plans to alleviate the condition would be forthcoming, he hoped.

A number of licenses were renewed in the township.

The supervisor asked that the office be closed on Saturday during the summer months as a courtesy. Clara Lane stated "that Saturday mornings are the busiest of the week for the building department and if the office closed it would deprive the people of township service expected and that more service should be given rather than cutting back."
