SOUTHFIELD—At a meeting held Tuesday evening in Colony Hall, 47 Southfield township residents protested the school board election held May 26, claiming that the election was illegal inasmuch as the board used discretion to influence and restrict certain voters their legal rights.

At least four persons were present who claimed they had not been allowed to vote, even though they had registered.
