# Exchange Clubs' Model Plane Meet Set for June 25, 26

Several vicinity entries are expected in the annual model aircraft Michigan state meet, sponsored by the Academy of Model Aeronautics and the Exchange clubs of metropolitan Detroit. It will be held at the Ford test field from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. June 25 and 26. This will include outdoor free flight, control line, and all classes of stunt flight.

The Michigan Wing of the Civil Air Patrol will have charge of field control. Trophies, medals and prizes will be awarded in all events. The meet is open to the public.

All contestants must be residents of the State of Michigan and holders of current Academy of Model Aeronautics licenses. On Saturday, June 25, the competition will include free flight by gas-powered craft for combined A and B classes; outdoor stick and control line flight for combined A and B classes; and precision acrobatic flight and control line jet flight will also be held on this date.

The Sunday events will combine classes C and D for free flight, gas power, outdoor cabin and control line, as well as control line jet. The jet events will be flown only in the senior open class.

Junior entrants will be included up to 16 years, with those of that age and over, classes as seniors. Entry cards may be obtained from recreation centers, hobby shops and exchange clubs. Entries should be made at once to insure proper registration.
