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**Methodist Children Send CARE Packages to Kronach, Germany**

For two months the children of the primary department of the First Methodist Sunday school have been collecting pennies and during the accumulation of the pennies the youngsters have been making "Planting Goodness" in accordance with the weekly income which served as an aid in financing their program. They require \$4.00 to purchase one package of seeds, and the first four dollars in seed money has been decided to purchase two packages at \$8.00.

While these seeds are providing vegetables for war victims, they will, at the same time, be speaking a message of peace to the children to the youngsters of the Evangelical Church in Kronach, Germany. Each package contains 28 different vegetables, and will plant a garden 50x150 feet. These packages are being shipped to Kronach CARE, and will continue a relationship which has developed between the primary department and these children of the Kronach church.

Mrs. Harold Chalk and her staff report that an excited interest has existed among the children over this project, which is the third major contact which these children have made with the children in Kronach.
