Dog Owners Asked to Back Amendment to Present Bill

In view of the fact that several vicinity dogs fell victim to gun blasts in the past year, local dog owners are being asked by Mrs. George Collins to join in seeking an amendment to House Bill 593. This bill states that a farmer has the right to shoot dogs which are molesting his domestic animals, which all dog owners grant is no more than fair. However, a second paragraph in the bill states that dogs may be shot if they are not in the immediate vicinity of their owner or handler. This makes every hunting dog, as it ranges the field, fair game for anyone who seems to be in the vicinity of the dog.

Mrs. Collins' own dog was a victim of a man about three ago who, she said, admitted shooting the puppy, not because he wanted to kill it but because he wanted to hurt it.

She is being supported in her drive to have this bill amended, to give some protection to dogs, by Harold Glases, president of the kennel club in Lansing, and an attorney in that city.

Mrs. Collins asks Birmingham representatives, Howard R. Estes, or Louis Harrison asking his support of this amendment. The hearing will be held sometime this week.
