Ohio Outplays Michigan for 'Slam' Trophy

Coming from behind, Ohio staged a whirlwind finish to trim Michigan for the Interstate Trophy Friday night at Cranbrook School. Michigan's under-rated team sprang a surprise by taking the lead by two matches to one at mid-evening. Then the Buckeye men's doubles pair upset Michigan's favored Burns-Anderson combination, evening the match score at two-all.

Contests Are Close

Close contests featured the "battle of champions" on the fifth and final match. Only three points decided the issue in ladies' singles. Mildred Sirwalta, Detroit, edged out Marguerite Wright of Warren, Ohio, in two overtime games—13-12, 13-11. A slim two points was the margin in men's singles, which went to three hard-fought games. Edward DiLeonio, Cleveland, was faced to the limit to down Harry Drewry, Detroit, by scores of 16-15, 12-15, 15-12. Margy Wright and Mrs. Stille carried the strong Mildred Sirwalta-Hazel Browns team to three games in ladies' doubles, finally losing out by scores of 15-17, 15-8. Norman Atchison and Stanley Sangdahl, both of Cleveland, rated as underdogs in men's doubles against Gerry Burns and William Anderson. They turned the table handling them after a 15-17, 15-8, 15-10.

Trophy Is Presented

Handicapping Jens Busch, using a Danish wrist-strap and fast cross-court drives unfamiliar to U.S. players, and his partner Hans Browne took a comfortable lead of 8-3 in the deciding mixed doubles finale. Then smooth team work paid off for the Stilles, who settled matters in two games of 15-8, 15-8. The Interstate Trophy, donated as an annual award by the Birmingham Badminton Club, was presented to Whitney Warner, Jr., of Cleveland, at a reception after the matches at Bloomfield Open Hunt Club. Warner is president of the Ohio Badminton Association. The trophy will remain in Ohio custody until the next Interstate tournament is held in Ohio next year, also under the joint auspices of the Ohio and Michigan Badminton Associations.

Mallender and O'Gorman Given Nod by Veterans

BVO Vice-President Bruce L. Pettypiece will notify Mayor Milton E. Mallender and John S. O'Gorman today that their candidacies carry Birmingham Veterans' Organization's endorsement. BVO broke precedent last week and voted to endorse candidates in the city commission race. "We broke our custom of impartiality in elections," said Dean N. Smith, president of BVO. "We discovered a misconception after Neil Spicer, a member of our board of directors, studied the current city commission race. The mistaken thought in the minds of some in Birmingham is that BVO has before endorsed candidates. We never did before, but we have now. Our candidates are Mayor Mallender and O'Gorman."

Good Citizenship

"The time and effort cost of holding office on the city commission is tremendous. When capable men will consent to run, BVO has an obligation. That debt is to announce our findings. Our charge comes from the fact that BVO tries to evaluate city affairs. "Our primary mission is good citizenship. We urge all voters to get out and vote April 4 no matter whom they vote for. We make no claim on political ambitions or any hunger for civic power," said Smith.

Dr. McClusky to Address Council Delegates April 7

Dr. Howard J. McClusky of the University of Michigan Extension Service department of education, one of the national authorities on Community Councils, will talk to Birmingham Community Council on Thursday, April 7, at the Community House at eight o'clock. His subject will be "What Makes a Good Community Council?" After he has talked the meeting will become a discussion of Council problems by Dr. McClusky and delegates from the 40 organizations which belong to the Birmingham Council.
