UN Successes Greater Where The Veto Does Not Apply

"Where UN action does not wait upon the veto," progress is the rule rather than the exception," according to Mrs. Irene Murphy, social welfare adviser in the department of social affairs of the Economic and Social Council. Mrs. Murphy was taking part in a United Nations discussion at a meeting given by Mrs. Dorothy K. Roosevelt at her home on Dorchester road last Thursday.
For example, Mrs. Murphy pointed out that while she has over and over of the stalemate in the Security Council due to the "veto" which truly gives the big powers more vote, in the Economic and Social Council, the majority vote determines action to be taken. Small nations and large vote as equals; more often than not, the majority of the 58 voting members (Russia included) is for beneficiary action being taken.

Mrs. Murphy emphasized that it is hard for us here in the United States to know how much work is being done in the world supplied by us. We are a giving nation. Without being in the receiving nations, we cannot evaluate the vast amount of help, encouragement and progress engendered by our actions through the United Nations.
Mrs. Stanley A. Cain, using a chart, gave a brief resume of the purpose and structure of the UN. Mrs. F. G. Garrison led the discussion.
Mrs. Norma-Lyle added that it's the women who have the role to play in this aftermath of war and she offered her home for a similar gathering in the near future.

"Brigadoon" to Be Sponsored by Michigan Alumni

"Brigadoon," musical comedy hit now on tour after a two-year run on Broadway, will come to the Cass Theater in Detroit on Sunday, April 17. Its second performance, Monday night, April 18, will be jointly sponsored by the University of Michigan alumni and alumnae clubs of Birmingham. Acting as co-chairmen of the project for their respective groups will be Max B. Tunncliffe and Mrs. Richard Strickland.
By choosing to sponsor "Brigadoon," Birmingham alumni of the University of Michigan hope to provide several University of Michigan scholarships for deserving young men and women of Birmingham.

"Brigadoon" was winner of the Critics' Prize as best musical of the year in 1947 and was included in Burns Mantle's compilation of that year's Ten Best Plays. It is an imaginative story of a mysterious little town in the Scottish Highlands which comes to life for one day every hundred years.

Two American youths happen by on the day the village awakes in this century and on their activities hinges the plot of the play. Comedy, romance, dancing, and such musical numbers as "Almost Like Being in Love," "The Heathen on the Hill," "There But for You Go I," and "Waitin' for My Dearie" are effectively woven into the story.

Speaker States China's Problem Can't Be Solved With Marshall Plan for Asia

"The Russians are going to make their big mistake in Asia. In China, Russia will be stopped," was a statement made by Dr. George Shephard, who for six years was advisor to Chiang Kai-shek. He spoke at the annual spring luncheon of the Community House on Monday afternoon. Dr. Shephard went on to say that it would be human energy, not atomistic energy, that will stop the Russians, and predicted that in 10 or 12 years the Russians will be very glad to get out of China.
"Some of us who have lived in China a long time," he stated, "have become quite gleeful about the situation. We think it will be good for Russia and not so bad for China. Beyond the few years of Russia's domination of China lies the people's revolution."

Dr. Shephard stated that China's problems are the problems of the revolution and are three: ignorance, superstition and malnutrition. The answer to all these problems is found in the "scientific mind." Scientific agriculture is the only answer to the food problem of the Chinese, and the Americans you cannot push!"

Age-Old Foundation
Dr. Shephard lived for 20 years in China and in 1933 was sent by the National Council of Churches to help General Chiang Kai-shek fight Communism. His colorful and enlightening accounts of the country's long political struggle with her age-old foundations of Confucianism, explained why we cannot solve the China problem with a Marshall Plan for Asia.
Dr. Shephard admonished the League members not to confuse the present Communist regime in Russia with the peoples' revolution. The only revolution China has ever had, he pointed out, was brought about by the teachings of Confucius. He changed China completely and it is still living in the old world of Confucianism.

A Rich Country
He also asked the audience not to make the mistake of thinking that China is a poor country because she is as materially rich as the United States and richer. Her natural resources are tremendous and her soil is the best. Her people are poor, but they do not need
