

City Recreation Board Disapproves of Henrietta-Pierce Playground

The city would do better to use \$2,500 in the improvement of the present city recreation areas rather than in the purchase of a neighborhood playfield in the Henrietta-Pierce area. That was the decision at last week's meeting of the city recreation board as reported to the city commission Monday night by Commissioner William Martin, who is also a member of the recreation board.

reaction board that if the city has \$2,500 to spend on parks, the board would rather see it spent on the development of existing facilities rather than in the acquisition of additional park property," Martin said.

World Give 5-Year Option
Possibility of a neighborhood playground was presented several weeks ago when the owner of six lots, comprising an area 150 by 209 feet, offered the city the use of the property in lieu of taxes

and special assessments. The city would also be given a 5-year option to buy the lots for \$3,500.

Several neighbors have protested the creation of a playfield here after the parks and recreation sub-committee of the city plan commission had recommended it. The city commission will consider the proposal again March 21, after the plan commission meets March 10 and reviews the matter.

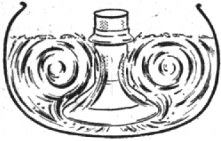

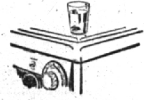
