Following a short business meeting, Carl Womberger, head of the English department of Cranbrook, will speak on "Modern Methods of Teaching Reading Technique."



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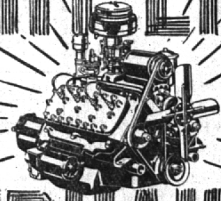
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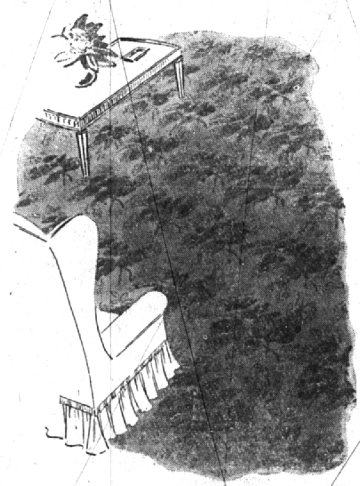
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
