### Residents Ask City to Change Name of Street

A petition asking the city to change the name of Bennettsville street, between Grant and Edgewood, from Bennettsville to Meadow Drive, has been submitted to the city commission.

Signed by 13 residents, the petition states that the street is "Home located on property west of Grant street, by virtue of appearance, quality and their recent construction, represent a section of Birmingham distinctly different from that part of Bennettsville east of Grant street."

"Changing the name, as petitioned, would definitely increase the desirability for the property on the south side of the street for the construction of additional new homes."

The petition also points out that two other streets in this area with eastern frontages at Grant do not continue with the same name: Southland and Catalpa, respectively. Mrs. R. W. Wiper of Henley drive.

The petition was referred to City Manager Donald C. Egbert for a report and recommendation.

### School Addition Wins Award for Architect Firm

The architectural firm of O'Dell, Hewlett & Luckenbach won an Award of Merit for the design of its Wing Lake School in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan.

The award was one of seven given nationally in the First Honor Award Program of the American Institute of Architects at its recent 84th Annual Convention in Houston, Tex.

This school, which was the only award obtained by Michigan architects is an addition to a stone school house built in 1886. The problem was to harmonize contemporary facilities for a lower elementary school with the old building.

The old field stone school and the new stone addition is on a large site among fine old trees located on West Maple at Wing Lake Road. The large windows of the kindergarten face south, this room is in pleasant colors making it light and airy. The green glass chalkboard follow the scheme.
