Jerry Waldo of the Birmingham Postoffice carefully explained to residents in this area this week what has happened to the mail service between Greenfield and LaSalle. Everyone from Greenfield to Evergreen, between 13 and 14 mile roads, should immediately discontinue the use of any route number. Homes between Evergreen and LaSalle are on Route 5 and the following do not apply: A temporary mounted route has been assigned and all mail should be marked only with street and number. Mail will be delivered once a day until this is made a regular route, at which time there will be two deliveries. C.O.D. and registered mail will be delivered but money orders will not be accepted in the future. Seven-day service will be given on special arrangements. Waldo reminds that there is a route 7 on the east side of Woodward and mail addressed to same will be necessarily delayed a day in reaching the addressee.

The post office will gladly answer any further questions.
