**Kingswood-Cranbrook Summer Institute to Open Classes June 20**

Following the policy of making facilities available to the community during the summer, Kingswood and Cranbrook schools announced this week the dates of their Summer Institute, which will be in session from June 20 through July 29.

As in previous years, programs are planned for both children and adults. The program for children will include swimming in the outdoor pools in addition to courses in weaving, ceramics, drawing and painting for girls and arts, crafts and riflery for boys. Tennis may be engaged in by both boys and girls as well as softball, nature study and organized play activity.

With the exception of weaving, which will be taught in the morning in the evening. These classes will include photography, drawing and painting, ceramics and silverwork. Studios at Kingswood and Cranbrook will be used.

The Institute will be headed again this year by Grace A. Fry and William Schultz, Jr., as co-directors and Virginia Duker will again be registrar. The majority of the instructors are regular members of the staffs of Cranbrook School, Kingswood School and Brookside School.
