The motion was made and supported that the plan be adopted and that actions proceed upon the same as soon as \$2,500 had been subscribed. Carried. A subscription committee was appointed consisting of the Rev. Salyer, Mr. Parmenter and Mr. Thurlay. Then Mr. Jackson, Mr. Voorheis and Mr. Parmenter were appointed to be the construction committee."
