Leaders Comment on League of Women Voters' Efforts for UN Understanding

During the past few weeks members of the Birmingham League of Women Voters have been issuing every available bit of information concerning the United Nations, climaxing their efforts in the Town Meeting held Monday night. Their efforts have not been confined to Birmingham alone, but have brought favorable comment from outside as well as local sources.

Among those who have spoken of the work the League has done are W. K. Kelsey, well-known columnist, George Donnelly, congressman from the 17th district, and Elliott Kinney, president of the local real estate board.

Kelsey said, "I admire the League of Women Voters for many reasons. One is that it is factual, not emotional, in its approach to public questions.

"In Birmingham, the League has taken special interest in the United Nations. I believe most of us take the UN too much for granted. It exists, but what good is it? Is it ever going to amount to anything?"

"Some 30 years ago, shortly after the close of World War I, met the American consul in London, who said: 'Do you believe the Senate will ratify the League of Nations?'"

"He replied: 'I don't know. What I do know is that if we have the ball at our feet. If we have guts enough to pick it up and carry it, we can get the world according to our liking.' He slapped me on the shoulder. 'You see it too!'"

Get the Ball Again
"At the end of World War II we again had the ball at our feet. This time we picked it up. We were foremost in the organization of the United Nations. We have been loyal to the Charter. We have gone beyond it by assisting war-devastated nations to rebuild—an act of generosity unparalleled in the world's history. We tell ourselves that we have acted for self-interest; the fact remains that no other nation ever did the like for that reason, or any other."

"We can make the United Nations succeed, if we will. We can let it fail, if we will. I believe even the Russians see that the United Nations is the only hope for world peace in our time. It is on God's side, but Satan still wields a powerful weapon—disinformation."

Town Meeting Helps
Congressman Donnelly asserted "The United Nations has my support from its very inception. It was my belief when the UN was established that such an organization would give hope and promise to the people of the earth that some day they might know war

no more. Its success has been pronounced as we have desired, due mainly to the obstructions of one nation. Its objectives, however, remain the same; and, though good has been accomplished, it still has faith in the success of its undertakings, and I believe that the peace-loving people of the world share that same view."

"Your Birmingham UN Town Meeting did, I am sure, contribute much to the better understanding and stimulate interest in activities of the United Nations. I take this opportunity to commend the League of Women Voters of Birmingham for its active support of such a project."

Grand Contribution
Kinney's comment was "The League voters should certainly be congratulated for their public-spirited efforts in sponsoring the United Nations Community Campaign and Town Meeting.

"The able and aggressive League workers of Birmingham have for some time made a grand contribution in awakening a better sense of civic responsibility and concern among Birmingham residents. The Real Estate Board of Birmingham well aware of the hard work this group always performs telling taxpayers and citizens about current elections, candidates, and matters appearing on the ballot.

"We hope the League will not diminish either its efforts or enthusiasm in continuing its fine endeavors to make known to all of us a 'better' Birmingham needs the League of Women Voters."

Lt. Nys Transferred to Duty at Guam as a Radar Navigator

GUAM — Second Lieutenant Pierre E. Nys has recently arrived on Guam to serve with the United States Air Force. While on Guam he will fly as radar navigator with the 83rd bombardment squadron of the famous 19th bombardment group. Nys's wife, the former Miss Mary Eleanor Wendt, resides at 1128 Southfield road, Birmingham, Michigan.

Lieutenant Nys is the holder of two aeronautical ratings—radar operator and navigator. He is not flying Libanets, but supervises the care and maintenance of his B-29 aircraft. In the evenings he teaches French to his fellow airman. He enlisted in the air force in October 1943, then went to San Marcos, Texas, where he earned his wings and commission in the air force. Later he attended radar school at Victorville, Calif. This second rating made his flying a double threat to axis powers.

Prior to his enlistment in the air force, Lieutenant Nys attended the College St. Nicholas in Liege, Belgium and also acted as a tutor of languages.

Former Resident to Return Here After 20 Years in France

Mrs. Catherine Floyd Mauduit has written former classmates here that she plans to return to Birmingham to make her home as soon as circumstances will permit. A member of the Baldwin high school class of 1921, she has lived in France for the past 20 years.

After completing her formal education in this country, Catherine Floyd went to Paris where she became an English teacher in one of the city's universities. She later was married to Marcel Mauduit, also a teacher, who with his father, died in a concentration camp during World War II.

In later years Mrs. Mauduit was associated with the American Library in Paris. Last summer she returned to the United States to do graduate work in library at Columbia University. She visited Birmingham during her stay in this country to attend a reunion of her Baldwin classmates.

Her mother-in-law, Mrs. Henri Mauduit, with whom she had made her home in Paris, died March 11. In a recent letter to former classmates, Mrs. Mauduit said, "There is nothing to keep me here any longer. I have, of course, lost my American citizenship through my marriage, and will have to return home under the regular French quota. As soon as I can get rid of the legal red tape, and find a sponsor for myself in the States, I will be home—this time to stay!"

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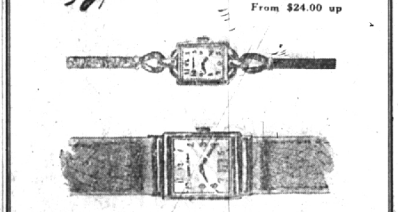
