Outlines General Elementary School Situation and Need for Expansion

Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, superintendent of schools, presented plans being considered for the new Birmingham high school at a meeting of the PTA last Thursday evening.

Dr. Ireland outlined the general elementary school situation in Birmingham and explained the pressing need for expansion to take care of the increase in the school population. He emphasized the fact that the existing elementary schools cannot be enlarged much further to accommodate this growth and that the new high school would alleviate the pressure by freeing Baldwin high school for use as a grade school.

Charts showing the architect's plans for the new school were shown and Dr. Ireland stated that

a modern school plan for Birmingham should take care of the child's general educational needs, his special needs (such as art, music, etc.), his physical needs and his social and cultural needs.

New Officers: Malcolm Ferguson, PTA school principal, outlined the present situation and the prospects for next year at Pierce when a sizeable increase in enrollment is expected to more than fill the four new rooms now under construction. According to Ferguson, the number of children attending the school increased 30 per cent this year, not counting the 108

children who were transferred to Pierce from other schools. Election of officers for the PTA for next year was held and the following were elected: president, James S. Moon; mother vice-president, Mrs. Elliott E.
