## Junior Theater Group to Present Story of the Dancing Queen, July 18

The Junior group of the recreation board's Summer Theatre program, according to Mrs. Irene Mortensen, will include children from four years to high school age. Any in this age bracket who wish may enroll for the school course which will begin June 20, at Baldwin high school. A fee of \$2 per child will be charged for the entire course. All classes for these youngsters will be held at Baldwin high school.

As a part of the summer recreation program, Mrs. Mortensen will direct the children and prepare them for the huge pageant which will climax their summer program. This is planned to be presented at Pierce field on July 18.

Mrs. Mortensen reports that there have been many inquiries concerning the type of program which is planned for the youngsters. She says a definite program cannot be arranged until enrollment has been completed.

As a result of a day however, will include an hour a day for three days a week for some. Others may be scheduled for two hour classes, twice a week. The arrangement of these classes will depend largely on the age of the children and the type of role the individuals will be assigned in the pageant, according to Mrs. Mortensen. She has scheduled classes for physical activity for the morning hours, to avoid the stronger heat of the afternoon.

Each child will be given the opportunity to use some of his own creative ability in the planning of the pageant. Many children want to dance, others may want to sing while still others may prefer to act. Each will be worked into the field in the greatest desire and talent for.

Mrs. Mortensen plans to base the pageant on the story of the Dancing Queen, Ermalinda, according to Mrs. Mortensen, "lived in a sparkling white palace and devoted dancing, art, music and many other things to her and her people. They will be sending the youngsters in her training these youngsters in dance routines and the other roles which will make up the presentation. They will also assist her in the technical work connected with such a program.

## In Good Shape Cranbrook Plans Memorial Service

On Memorial Day, Cranbrook school alumni and friends will join the student body at Christ Church Cranbrook to memorialize the Cranbrook boys who died in the war and to pay tribute to the 646 young men who served in uniform in service.

Following the service at the church, students at Cranbrook and the alumni will gather before the bronze memorial plaque representing the Cranbrook School War Memorial Scholarship Fund. Here Headmaster Stabler will introduce Col. James E. Bush, father of James E. Bush, Jr., of the Army Air Corps who was killed during the war. At the conclusion of his remarks, Col. Bush, now on active duty with the Fifth Army in Detroit, will place a wreath at the base of the plaque on which are inscribed the 683 names of Cranbrook boys who served during the war.

A short address by Dr. Paul L. Connolly, president of the Cranbrook alumni association, and graduate of the class of 1941, will be given, after which Chaplain Walter E. Young will offer the prayer and benediction. A member of the Cranbrook school orchestra will sound taps and the ceremony will be concluded with a flag raising conducted by the members of the lower school.
