Once again garden and flower lovers are invited to stroll through local gardens ordinarily closed to the public. The Detroit Garden Center will offer the public an opportunity to view 88 gardens throughout the Detroit area over four successive weekends beginning May 21 and 22.

The gardens will be open from 1:00 p.m. until 7:00 p.m. rain or shine. The tour is divided into sections including gardens from Grosse Pointe and East Detroit to Dearborn, Grosse Ile, Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills and Northville.

Large and small, formal and informal, the gardens run the gamut of horticultural variety, ranging from large estates developed with every device of landscape art to small home gardens which the owners have designed, planted and maintained.

Tips on Touring

An expert driver I know makes a living by breaking traffic rules and regulations in different cities. With the full cooperation of the police and traffic officials, he gets into his car and races through the city ignoring red lights, stop signs, speed laws and go-slow warnings.

Then, when his hair-raising course has been run, he goes back over the same route and obeys every traffic rule to the letter. The difference in time usually amounts to

about three minutes. You and I have both seen this type of driver—only he's not an expert and not paid to demonstrate safety lessons. He's the fellow (or woman) who screams by you on highway hills, dodges in and out of city traffic like a broken field runner, and makes you uneasy about your children going to school a few blocks away.

These devil-take-the-hind-most drivers are problems for your local traffic officers and the courts—but there are two immediate steps you can take now: (1) drive sanely yourself and (2) teach your youngsters, by example and explanation, safe driving habits.

No need for your son or daughter to face manslaughter charges later if you start your own family driving education now.
