B of E Asks for \$1 Million Budget for Next Year.

A tentative 1949-50 school district budget of \$1,098,893.19 was approved by the Board of Education at its Tuesday evening meeting.

This figure marks a proposed \$114,207.21 increase over last year's budget.

The board will ask the county tax allocation committee for 8.0 mills of the 15-mill limitation that supports school, township and county operations. This is a mill and a half more than the school district was allotted last year by the county, and is in addition to the 5 mills the school district has voted the board beyond the tax limitation.

The final budget figure will not be known until the county apportions the 15 mills, late this summer.
