Pt. Huron Averages Four Defeats from Maple Track Team

For the first time in four years the Birmingham track team took a back seat in a dual meet when a surprising Port Huron outfit upset the local champs Sunday, 4:45 last Friday at Pierce field.

This is the first time in the history of sport relations between the two schools that a Port Huron track team has defeated one from Birmingham, or even come close. But while the Blue Water Boys were about it, they did a thorough job and walked off with nine first places outright and split another.

Bright Spot

One of the few bright spots of the day for the Maples was the 100 yard dash when Jerry McMillin hit the tape 1/4 second after the starting gun sounded. Four events later, Bob Polin and Joe Ross finished onto in the 220, giving the Maples a good showing in the dashes at least.

The Maples' 880 relay team looked good as Joe Ross, Jerry McMillin, Rick Cunningham and Bob Polin sped around the track in near record time.

One of the main factors in the defeat was the performance of Port Huron's Bud Way. He competed in all events and took firsts in all of them. In both hurdles he edged out Bud Boynton, and then switched to field events winning the pole vault and broad jump.

Port Huron made a clean sweep of the broad jump, the last hope for a Maple victory.

Win Season Opener

The team launched its 49 track season April 26 at Channahon, by romping over the Grapes and Hops. It was a triumph, amassing 73 1/2 points to Cranbrook's 41 1/5 and the Parkers' 29 1/5.

In the victory the Maple cinderman topped ten of his 13 first places. The Maple were paced by Bud Boynton who came through with three firsts, good for 15 points. Bud's three victories came in the hurdle events and the high jump.

One of the best showings of the day was made by Cranbrook's Bob Maxwell in the mile. The little distance runner turned in a time of 4:55.

The Maple dashmen came through again and finished first and second in both the 100 and 200 yard dashes, Jerry McMillin and Joe Ross taking the 100, while Bob Polin and Conrad Burkman took the 220.
