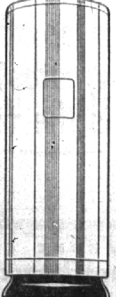

The Birmingham branch of the AAUW has recently honored a local woman, Mrs. Charles Shain, by naming a newly established International Study Grant in her honor.

The Ruth Edger Shain International Study Grant will bring a foreign woman from some war devastated country over to our country to study for one year. This scholar will then return to her native land and put into practical use her learning. The AAUW thinks this is a permanent investment for lasting world peace.

First of its Type This is the first grant of this type established in this territory, although this is a national project of the AAUW. The State of Michigan has five such name grants located in Lansing, Kalamazoo, Ann Arbor, Midland and now in Birmingham.

Mrs. Shain, a prominent citizen of this community has long been known for her outstanding work as leader of the International Relations Class which she established 26 years ago. She also was one of the founders of the Birmingham branch of the AAUW which she helped organize in October, 1919, and served as first president of the organization.

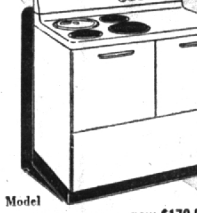

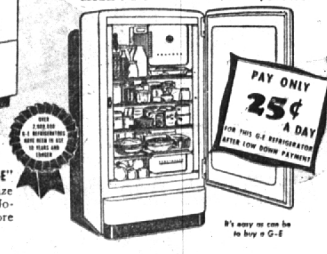
