Gossett and Mrs. William Crawford. For admittance to the tea, members of the League and their guests are asked to bring rummage.

Approximately 101 attended the breakfast which, Mrs. Brewster said, is another all-time high total.

Speaker Gives Many Hints Discussing "Decorative Tables for the Home"

Approximately 226 Birmingham Garden Club members attended the buffet luncheon in the Community House last Monday. Honored were the 14 new members who were each presented with a corsage made by Mrs. G. O. Cutler.

Mrs. Hazel F. Dunlop, author and lecturer, who spoke to the group on "Decorative Tables for the Home" talked in terms of practical informal living.

In giving her five rules for decorating, she stressed that one should have imagination. This was indicated especially in her table

for children where she used shiny green wrapping paper the length of the table in place of a cloth. This was two small arrangements made of red pimentones which were wired together like grape bunches, and some little paper figures of leprechauns in green.

There should also be charm in the home as was illustrated with a simple but effective vase of evergreen and a few white erythranthemums.

Good Taste

Good taste, especially in table setting, was emphasized by Mrs. Dunlop in that one would not use fine china with plaid gingham or artificial flowers.

It was suggested that texture is important, for one might use felt on a table for exhibition purposes but would not find it practical for household use.

Then the pattern or placement serves as a balance. For overcrowding makes everyone uncomfortable and the effect of individual pieces of beauty is lost.

Christmas Theme

Wreaths were shown to the group which were easily made on circles of copper screen wire. Solid pine-cone pieces or greens with fruit or berries can be wired to this base without much difficulty.

Weathered and shapely bare branches were used with shaggy mums of red and yellow and a mahogany lazy susan with an arrangement of avocado, acorn squash, ochra, peppers, grapes and the addition of a few magnolia leaves centered a round red-clothed table.

Pine cones for Christmas should be gathered green in August, allowed to stand in the sun for two days. Then boiling water should be poured over them to take out the excess turpentine and if they are dried out in a warm oven, will take on a red color in the center.
