

Local Business Women's Club Will Finance Moving of Scout Cabin

"Because many of its members have happy memories of Girl Scout days, the Birmingham Business Women's Club has offered to assist the Girl Scouts in relocating their Springdale Park cabin," Mrs. Cassius Miller, president of the Birmingham Girl Scouts has announced.

"A decade ago when the cabin was built by the Lion's Club, Mrs. Miller continued, "its far-sighted members built it in sections so that it might easily be dismantled should the need arise."

The necessity has arisen now for an enlarged camping program and as soon as a desirable camp site is available, it will be moving day for the Birmingham Girl Scout cabin. All this will be brought about through the assistance of the local Business Women's organization which will cover the expense of moving and reconditioning.

Birmingham was a smaller community ten years ago when the cabin was erected and 200 girls comprised the membership of the local Scout branch. Springdale Park, in those days, was not the popular spot it has recently become either. And as camping is an essential part of the Girl Scout program and as now there are 655 girls registered as Brownies and Girl Scouts, "growing pains" have of late crept over the organization in regards to the Scout cabin.

More Remote Spot

Alert to the needs of the girls, as all leaders of the Scouts attempt to be, Mrs. L. D. Gilliam,

chairman of camping for the Girl Scout Council here, has revealed that an improved and expanded camping program is about to be embarked upon.

That is where the new camp site becomes first place in the minds of all Scouts and their leaders. A site less public than Springdale Park, for vandalism and burglary have made it necessary for the Girl Scout organization to become its own insurers as insurance companies no longer will insure.

Them, too, Birmingham Girl Scouts are growing up in camping and desire a more secluded spot for their cabin where they may rough it in true Scout style. With the cabin as an outpost for supplies, they would like to spread their bedrolls on the ground and sleep under the stars in a more remote spot.

To further augment the camping program, Mrs. Gilliam stated that next summer many more girls will go trip camping. Such camping was done last summer on a very limited scale and so enthusiastic were the girls that they're planning means to acquire two large tents to use on such trips so that bedrolls, food and other supplies will remain dry in the hardest downpour.
