

**Women Voters Hear State President At Monday Meeting**

At a luncheon meeting of the local League of Women Voters Monday in the Community House, Mrs. John Richardson, chairman of the organization's finance director announced the results of this year's campaign.

A grand total of \$1,013.50 was revealed over the named \$1,000 quota. Working with Mrs. Richardson was Mrs. Howard Liverance, finance chairman and a committee of 28 members.

Mrs. Wilbur Johnstone decorated the luncheon tables in a fall motif, with hints of fruits, vegetables and a bit of the hunting season.

Guest speaker was Mrs. Renais Likert, state president of the League who has just returned from Europe. Mrs. Likert spoke on the summer road, stressing a UN meeting she witnessed in Paris and commenting on the need for the inter-continental point-of-view that the inter-continental system fails to do competent justice at the moment.

She reported she saw anxiety over three points: inflation, a fear of an atomic war and a "question mark" as to what will happen after Marshall Plan aid is terminated in three countries, France, Holland and England.

"Right now," Mrs. Likert stated, "people abroad seem to find their economic problems more important than those of another war." She also reported a spiritual depression in England.

"It would seem to be a question of a change in attitudes rather than a scientific change abroad right at present," Mrs. Likert declared, and also felt that even if the Conservatives in England were in power, they would not do away with socialized medicine.

They called it his "car" and encouraged his natural tendency to imitate the way his dad drives the family automobile. Now it's a true game, Richard gets on the trike, throws in a start and

From the time the three-wheeler first came, Dad referred to the side-walks as "streets" and set up make-believe intersections, stop signs, lights, and traffic lanes. Once a week Dick gets a "check out" drive and is taught another simple little rule of traffic or safety.

Treated seriously and as a full-fledged "grown-up driver," Dick takes great delight in signaling left turns, deftly parking between two boxes, turning off the ignition and setting the hand brake when he dismounts. Dick's dad has a lot of fun teaching his son to be a good driver—and a good pedestrian—and he knows that when Dick starts to school this fall he'll be more than usually alert to traffic dangers.
