North Chevrolet All Stars will wear red, white and blue shirts and trunks; Virginia Market will wear blue shirts and trunks with gold lettering.

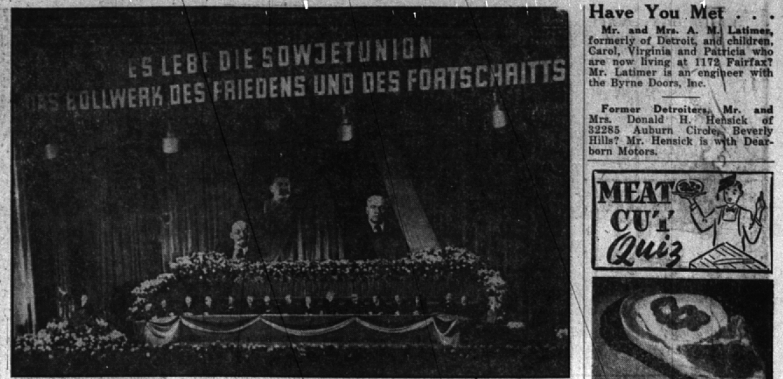

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?
A. This is a veal kidney chop.
Q. Where does the fat come from and how is it identified?
A. The veal kidney chop is cut from the rib end of loin. It is a loin chop cut to contain a cross-section of the kidney.
Q. How should this cut be prepared?
A. The veal kidney chop should be braised, as should all veal chops or steaks, since veal has little fat. Brown the meat in a small amount of oil or butter, add a small amount of liquid (1/2 cup) and cook the meat slowly with the pan covered, until the chops are tender. This takes from 45 to 60 minutes.
