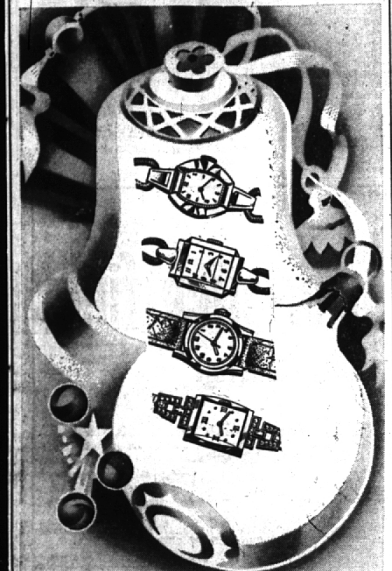

One of the finest forms of recreation young people can develop is that of horse back riding. There seems to be quite a lot to the quotation "My kingdom for a horse", and notwithstanding the few preliminary aches and pains an hour or so in the saddle instigates, there is much pleasure and enjoyment to be evolved from the sport.

The Aikens Club was inaugurated when one of the enthusiastic young equestriennes out at Outland's stables suggested to Miss Violet Hopkins, instructor there, that a club be organized for the junior riders.

It didn't take long to get

matters started and the Aikens, in formative stages now under the expert guidance of Mrs. Madge Ziesow and Miss Hopkins, has ten members to get it off to a hopeful beginning.

A room at the stables has been given over to the youngsters for use as a club house and at present, the riders are eagerly working on a project to raise money for furnishings. Their expectations are high and from the activity out there last Saturday, it would seem as if the tables and chairs they're counting on won't be long in the "wishful thinking" stage.

The group is open to anyone up to 18 years of age who is able to pass a horsemanship test. Most of its present members are versed in the art of jumping (their name was taken from the Aiken Jump) but ability to take a horse over a hurdle is not a requisite to membership.

Those in the organization must participate in a class for at least three months and after that should plan to be active in at least one class once a month.

As written in the by-laws, the purpose is stated: "As members of this club we wholeheartedly enter into the spirit of cooperation, understanding and appreciation of horsemanship and those things which attribute to making it an art."

Besides being designed to keep members in top equestrian shape, the club has a social angle to it too. Meetings are held the first and third Saturday morning of each month at which time the future plans for picnics, long rides through the country, parties and just about everything else youngsters that age enjoy, will be fulfilled.
