There he returned to a land of reality the people of which are poverty stricken, diseased and entirely without education enough to make decisions in regard to their own welfare. Where, the plague of the grasshoppers this year has destroyed even their usual meager crops so that their economic situation is bitter indeed.

"How many more generous, kindhearted sponsors will enable more of the Charlies and their sisters to taste a little of the good things of life—shirts, jackets—perhaps a toy? They need it so very, very much as they are such very worthwhile children."
