Boulder Memorial

Have you been wondering about that huge boulder on the Whitmer property on Walnut lake road? It weighs at least eight tons and was moved there on a trailer. A bulldozer pushed it onto the trailer, and it was brought from Inkerter road down Walnut Lake road to its present resting place. Originally, the stone was in front of the home of Mrs. A. H. Whitmer when she was a child. Her home has since been razed and the Sloat and Shank homes have been constructed on the site. Thirty years ago the huge boulder was moved across the road and there it remained until last week when Whitmer had it moved and placed on the line between his property and that of his son, Claude. Claude engineered the moving and the boulder becomes a landmark in memory of his mother.
