

Currently the Museum of the Cranbrook Academy of Art is showing drawings by Francis de Erdely and "A New Direction in Printmaking." Both shows will continue through Nov. 20.

Francis de Erdely is the assistant head of the department of fine arts for the University of California at Los Angeles and taught in Amsterdam for several years. He has won international prizes and recently was awarded the California water color society's purchase prize for his "Mexican Dance."

"A New Direction in Printmaking" is the work of Mauricio Lasansky of the State University of Iowa and his students. A native of Argentina, he was recommended for a Guggenheim Fellowship by Francis Henry Taylor, director of the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York.

After studying the prints of the old masters at the Metropolitan and working for eight months with Stanley William Hayter in Atelier 17, Lasansky joined the staff of the State University of Iowa where he has been teaching printmaking for the past three years.

The exhibition consists of more than 60 prints and original copper plates which reveals Lasansky's stature both as a printmaker and as a teacher. Museum hours are from 2 to 5 daily except Mondays and holidays.
